### **Are We A Tough Crowd?**

So often when stand-up comediennes are having a tough time getting a laugh, they will quip, "Wow, this is a tough crowd." I even saw a clip where Jerry

Seinfeld was doing stand up in a dinky, little comedy club and no one was laughing. And he was reminding them that "Hey, folks, listen, I'm Jerry Seinfeld. If you're not going to laugh at me, who are you going to laugh at?"

This last week Christie and I led the Bible Discovery class at VBS. Thus, I have new-found respect for our intrepid Sunday School teachers since primary school-age kids can be a "tough crowd". The reason? Well, there are several,

First of all, our kids have been preconditioned by modern media to resist thinking in a linear fashion. Atlantic Magazine carried an article entitled, "Google is Making Us Stupid" in which it showed how use of the Internet has made us into expert multi-taskers who tend to think tangentially. We are conditioned by hypertexts in news articles that carry us off in a dozen different directions. Add to that the pop-up ads, email alerts, and instant message notifications which distract us from our task, and we can understand why we have trouble thinking in a straight line. Therefore, kids these days are preconditioned to get you off topic, or become disruptive if you don't.

In addition to that, today's kids are a lot like the crowd in a comedy club, i.e. they are not shy about heckling you, or complaining that your material is not funny (or entertaining) or they just might happen to disagree with you and thus, they are not shy about letting you know.

This makes for a tough crowd. Thus, I think doing a 20-minute Bible lesson at VBS is a lot more challenging than preaching on Sunday mornings. (So, I've decided not to give up my day job;-)

But all those factors aside, I also believe that some comics react to a tough crowd because they may be saying the same string of jokes to them that they just delivered the night before at another club where the crowds were rolling in the aisles.

And what makes the difference?

It reminds me of the sermon that Jonathan Edwards delivered back in the 18th century that launched the First Great Awakening as his audience responded with tears of repentance, cries of joy, and changed lives that went on to change a nation. But ironically, this same sermon that sparked the First Great

Obviously, it was the receptivity of the audience. Like the Parable of the Sower, some soils are more responsive to the sowing of the Word than others.

Thus, my challenge to you is to not look on Sunday morning as the sole basis of your spiritual instruction for the week. Instead, I challenge you to be in the Word every day during your personal devotions and to become involved in one of our many small-group, Bible studies during the week, so that come Sunday, you arrive with a heart watered, fertilized, and receptive rather than a heart that is hardened, weedy, and rocky.

Indeed, I love the story of the two women who left Sunday service together, and one said to the other, "You know, Hazel, I didn't get anything out of that sermon today."

"Well," said Hazel, "maybe that's because you didn't bringing anything with you to carry it home."

Thus, this new academic year, I challenge you to come to church with a heart and mind prepared to receive what God has to say to you, so that you can respond with the amen of obedience and take home with you a week's worth of direction in His ways.

### A message from our editor

What do you find most valuable in a relationship?

This is a question that may seem simple, but when you take time to truly think about it, it is actually very profound. For some reason this question has been coming to my mind frequently during the past few weeks. There are so many attributes that are important in our relationships: honesty, kindness, generosity, authenticity, wit, compassion, patience, communication, integrity, respect? What is it for you?

All of those qualities are important, but I've come to the conclusion that for me the most valuable is reliability. This is not a word you are likely to find in the Bible, perhaps a more biblical term is 'faithfulness' or even 'steadfastness'. As I reflect on the relationships in my life, I realize that those friends and acquaintances that mean the most to me are those who are reliable - those who I can truly count on - the ones who show up. Bob often quotes Woody Allen's famous line "90% of success is showing up", and that for me really resonates with my soul in terms of relationships.

Back in they day when Ana McGuire Johndrow used to do her cultural adaptation seminars for newcomers to the island, she spoke about a trait that many in our culture have which is the desire to please and to say 'yes' to commitments or invitations that they may, in fact, not intend to fulfill. When I first moved to Puerto Rico, I was in the process of remodeling an apartment, and I remember how difficult it was to count on workmen showing up to complete a job. As they were leaving for the day, I would ask them if they were returning the next day, and the response was often 'Sí, si Dios quiere!'. I began to dread that phrase, because on so many occasions they didn't return the next day. They had said 'yes', because they wanted to please; yet in all probability they had other customers that were also waiting on them to show up. The same thing happens with party invitations as many of you know. People accept an invitation, yet they often just don't show up - no call, no text, they simply don't come. And the unusual thing is that they don't feel bad about it. They would rather say 'yes' and not show up than just say 'no'. After almost thirty years in Puerto Rico, I've gotten used to this and I expect it and even have come to understand it, but it does tend to disappoint me.

For me reliability has to do with trust and respect. When someone isn't reliable - and there is usually a pattern of unreliability - I have a hard time respecting them. So I have come to appreciate and really value people who are reliable in my life. My husband is the most reliable person I know, and my mom is as well. If they tell you they are going to do something, you can count on them - no matter what.

Actually I've been blessed with a lot of people in my life who I can count on. At church, what a blessing it has been for me to work with Loraine Colón, Raúl Diaz, Christopher Strong and Laurie Yost in the Backpack Program. I truly value and respect them for their authenticity and reliability. They have all donated their time and energy so selflessly and so faithfully. So many others help in so many ways, and I'm not underestimating their contributions, but these people have been so consistent and so steadfast, and I respect them so much. I don't tell them enough how much I value them, but I am very grateful to God for them!



Elsa Melendez is faithfully caring for her beloved husband Pablo. She is presently our longest standing member at 2UC.




Pastor Bob and Christie attended two very special weddings this summer.

### **Hurricane Recovery**

Second Union continues to play an active role in providing support to families who were severely affected by Hurricane Maria. Thanks to the new donations we have received, we continue to reach out to families who are still living in somewhat precarious situations. For anyone who has flown in or out of Puerto Rico in the last few months, it's heart-wrenching to see the number of blue tarps in the metro area. There are so many people who have yet to replace their roofs and they are still

living under tarps that were supposed to provide only a temporary shelter. A lot of our work has focused on the Yabucoa area as we have a great contact at the municipality who works with faithbased groups.

We have been blessed to have the opportunity to collaborate with different groups who have come from the States to provide ongoing support. Building Goodness Foundation is based out of Charlottesville, West Virginia. A group of dedicated and skilled volunteers primarily from the construction industry travel to different areas of the world where they . . . . build goodness! They have worked extensively in Haiti, Nicaragua, Honduras and now they have added Puerto Rico. The first project that we will be working on with them is the re-purposing of an abandoned



school that will be the new home for Posada La Victoria, a spiritual rehabilitation program for women who have addiction issues. Their facility was damaged severely, and they have been awarded this new facility which will allow them to grow their ministry. The guys from Building Goodness spent two weeks here taking measurements and discussing material requirements for this project and they will return to begin work within the coming months. While they were here, they helped us install a dishwasher that we purchased for Sandra, a lovely Christian woman in Toa Baja. Sandra was also the grateful recipient of a beautiful bedroom set that Eli and Serena Lozano donated prior to leaving the island. She is such a sweet, sweet person with a strong faith in the midst of tremendous trials - she is going through chemotherapy and

she was recently diagnosed with MS.

Another group that came to the island, was a mission team from Palm City Presbyterian Church in Florida. Jason, the youth pastor of this church is the son of Charlie Pridmore - you may have met him while he was the pastor at Union Church in Punta Las Marias. Jason and his wife Sherry along with several other

teenagers came to take on various projects. They worked for several days at The San Juan Community Library, painting and repairing things, and then they went with Christie to Yabucoa where they removed rotten and insect infecting ceiling and paneling from Alicia's home. 

Thelma Rivera was one of the pillars of our church, and she touched so many of our lives. She passed away on June after a brief illness.

Thelma Louise Roupp was born on August 7, 1932 in Wichita, Kansas. She was preceded by two older siblings, Dorothy and Albert. She graduated from Goshen College in Indiana, but it was while she briefly attended Heston College in Kansas that she met her husband-to-be, Julio Rivera. Julio was born in Puerto Rico and had been adopted into a Mennonite missionary family and they sent him to study at Heston College. Thelma and Julio were married in 1954 just six days after her graduation from college.

Thelma was raised in a Mennonite household which fostered her love of music. She arranged the music for her wedding, she played the

cello, and of course, she sang in the 2UC Choir for many years. Thelma was an accomplished seamstress and she loved figuring out how to make things work – she learned to reupholster furniture, rewire lamps and other small appliances and build things. She taught art at a junior high school, then she began working on her Masters in Art Education at St. Francis University in Fort Wayne, Indiana. She and Julio then moved to Ponce where Thelma completed her masters degree at The Catholic University. She taught school at the Episcopal Cathedral School.



After 30 years of teaching she retired and found a new career and passion as a watercolor artist and teacher. She helped many people find their talent. Many of her watercolor paintings adorn the church and the homes of 2UCers here and abroad. She loved painting, she loved playing games and she loved to help her family achieve their dreams. Whether it was sewing costumers for her children, leading flower arranging workshops, building sets, painting scenery, cutting letters for the church bulletin boards or making and teaching

the art of creating pie crusts, Thelma was always caring for others.
